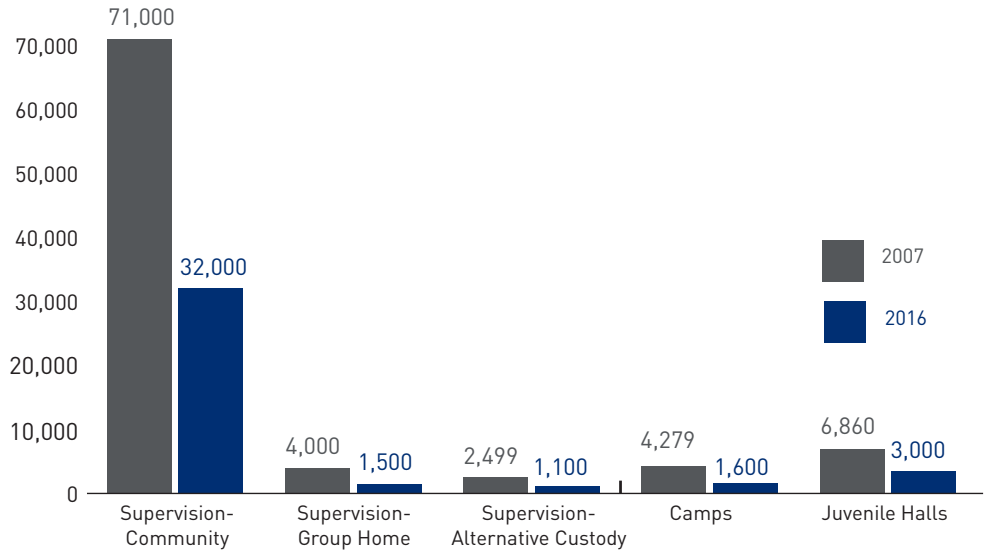


90% OF PROBATION YOUTH ARE SUPERVISED IN THE COMMUNITY

As of 2016, there are approximately 39,000 youth at varying levels of the county probation system, with 75%(29,000) being wards under W&I Code 602 for felony and misdemeanor crimes¹ (Figure 1).

Figure 1: Juvenile Probation Responsibilities, by Setting

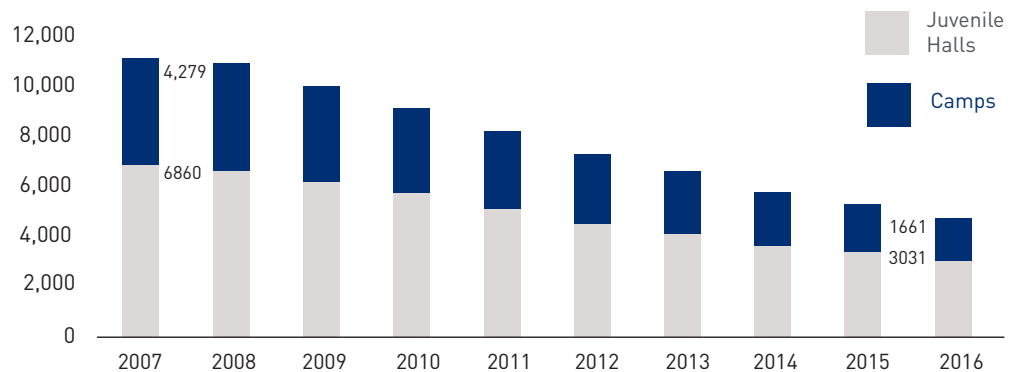


JUVENILE DETENTION USAGE IS DOWN 60% SINCE 2007

The 60% reduction in juvenile halls and camp population, down from 11,000 in 2007 to just over 4,200 in 2016 (Fig 2)², is evidence that probation departments are using a range of responses in the community and reflects the decline of youth entering the system.

Figure 2: Average Daily Detention Population, by Facility Type



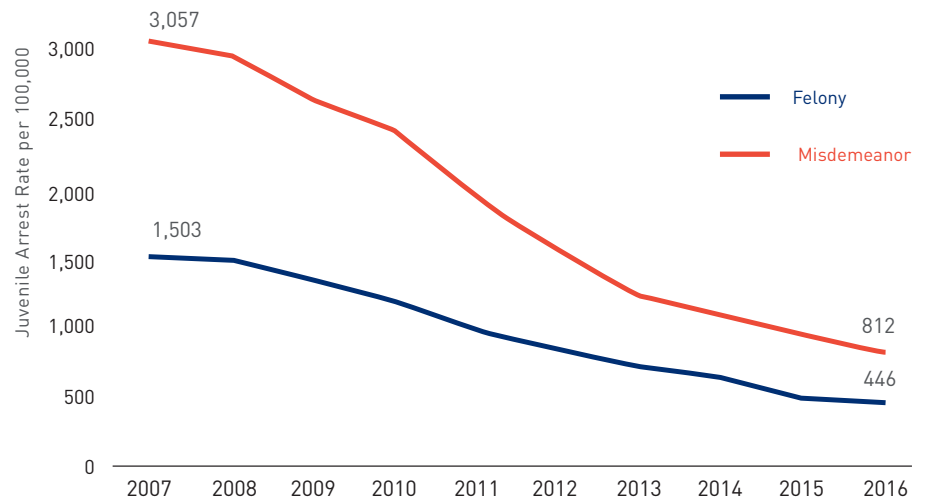


JUVENILE FELONY ARRESTS HAVE DECLINED **73%** SINCE 2007

Juvenile arrests have fallen to a multi-year low, dropping from 303,000 juvenile arrests of those age 10-17 in 2007 to 82,000 in 2014, representing a 73% decline (Fig 3)³. When converted to a population adjusted rate, felony juvenile arrests have declined from 1503 arrests per 100,000 10 to 17 year old, to 446 arrests per 10,000 10 to 17 year olds.

DJJ POPULATION IS DOWN **74%** SINCE 2007

Since 2007, the population of the Department of Juvenile Justice has fallen from 2,516 youth to 653 (Fig 4)⁴.
